often dangerous situation," Executive Director, Diane Nelson, stated. "It takes courage to make that call, to take the first step. And that's why we are here...so they don't have to do it alone."

So far this year in NC, 28 homicides can be attributed to domestic violence with victims ranging in age from 8 months to 79 years. Domestic violence knows no age limits, no socio-economic status, no race, no religion, and no distinction between males and females. According to the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence (NCADV), on average, nearly 20 people per minute are physically abused by an intimate partner in the United States. During one year, this equates to more than 10 million people, or 1 in 4 women and 1 in 9 men who experience severe intimate partner physical violence. Domestic violence is all too frequently kept a secret so the possibility of being able to reach those affected through an innocent coffee sleeve or library display could make all the difference in saving a life.

Everyone deserves a relationship healthy free of violence. Steps to HOPE offers 24hour crisis hotlines, emergency safe shelter, support and groups, counseling.
